## CHARLES R.

Whereas under section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d) and (dd) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to determine the denomination, the design and dimensions of coins to be made at Our Mint, to determine the weight and fineness of certain gold coins, the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins and their least current weight, and to determine the weight and composition of coins other than gold coins or coins of silver of Our Maundy money, and the remedy to be allowed in the making of such coins, to provide for the manner of measurement of the variation from the standard weight of coins, and to determine the percentage of impurities which such coins may contain:

And Whereas under section 3(1)(f) and (ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that coins made at Our Mint other than gold, silver, cupro-nickel and bronze coins shall be current and that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas under section 6(2) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to prescribe the composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of coins of any metal other than gold, silver or cupro-nickel:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denominations of fifteen thousand pounds, seven thousand pounds, five thousand pounds, two thousand pounds, one thousand pounds, five hundred pounds, two hundred pounds, one hundred pounds and twenty-five pounds in gold, a new series of coins of the denomination of five hundred pounds in gold piedfort, a new series of coins of the denominations of five hundred pounds, ten pounds and two pounds in standard silver, a new series of coins of the denomination of ten pounds in silver piedfort, and a new series of coins of the denomination of one hundred pounds in platinum:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section $3(1)(\mathrm{a})$, (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd), (f) and (ff), the said section 6(2), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

## FIFTEEN THOUSAND POUND GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of fifteen thousand pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 15030 grammes, a standard diameter of 220 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 35.94 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.75 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 14985.08 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured by weighing each coin separately.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription ". CHARLES III • D • G • REX $\cdot \mathrm{F} \cdot \mathrm{D} \cdot 15000$ POUNDS." and the date of the year, and for the reverse a portrait of Her

Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II accompanied by the inscription ". ELIZABETH REGINA 1926 - 2022 '". The coin shall have a plain edge.'

## SEVEN THOUSAND POUND GOLD COIN

2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of seven thousand pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 7035 grammes, a standard diameter of 185 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 35 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.5 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 6940 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured by weighing each coin separately.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "• CHARLES III • D • G REX $\cdot \mathrm{F} \cdot \mathrm{D} \cdot 7000$ POUNDS $\cdot "$ and the date of the year, and for the reverse a portrait of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II accompanied by the inscription ". ELIZABETH REGINA 1926 $-2022 \cdot "$. The coin shall have a plain edge.'

## FIVE THOUSAND POUND GOLD COIN

3. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of five thousand pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 5015 grammes, a standard diameter of 175 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 12 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.6 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 5000.01 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured by weighing each coin separately.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription ". CHARLES III • D • G • REX • F • D • 5000 POUNDS •" and the date of the year, and for the reverse a portrait of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II accompanied by the inscription ". ELIZABETH REGINA 1926 - 2022 '". The coin shall have a plain edge.'

## TWO THOUSAND POUND GOLD COIN

4. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of two thousand pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 2010 grammes, a standard diameter of 150 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 11.97 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.6 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 1995.04 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured by weighing each coin separately.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

## ONE THOUSAND POUND GOLD COIN

5. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of one thousand pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 1005 grammes, a standard diameter of 100 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 6 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.3 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 997.5 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured by weighing each coin separately.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.937 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 155.12 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:

7. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of two hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 62.42 grammes, a standard diameter of 40 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or fineness specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.24 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of two per mille.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 62.12 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription ". 8. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of one hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 32.69 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of not less than 999.9 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.12 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 31.06 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The design of the said gold coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription ". (2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 1.8 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.

15. (1) A new coin of platinum of the denomination of one hundred pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31.21 grammes, a standard diameter of 32.69 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said platinum coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.120 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The said platinum coin may contain impurities of five-tenths of one per centum.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of the said platinum coin shall be pure platinum.
(6) The design of the said platinum coin shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "• CHARLES III • D • G • REX • F • D $\cdot 100$ POUNDS $"$ and the date of the year, and for the reverse a portrait of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II accompanied by the inscription "• ELIZABETH REGINA 1926 2022 '". The coin shall have a grained edge.'
(7) The said platinum coin shall be current and shall be legal tender for payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section $3(1)(a),(b),(c),(c d)$ and (d) and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

## FIVE POUND GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard diameter of 36.02 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## TWO POUND GOLD COIN

2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of two pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard diameter of 28.4 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## SOVEREIGN GOLD COIN

3. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of a sovereign shall be made, being a coin of a standard diameter of 22.05 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## HALF-SOVEREIGN GOLD COIN

4. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of half-sovereign shall be made, being a coin of a standard diameter of 19.3 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## QUARTER-SOVEREIGN GOLD COIN

5. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of quarter-sovereign shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 1.997 grammes, a standard diameter of 13.5 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of 916.66 , and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or fineness specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.00972 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of two per mille.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(4) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 1.98 grammes.

## DESIGN OF THE COINS

6. The design of the said five pound, two pound, sovereign, half-sovereign and quarter-sovereign gold coins shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "• CHARLES III • DEI • GRA • REX • FID • DEF ", and for the reverse a depiction of Our Royal Arms and the date of the year. The coin shall have either a plain or grained edge.'

And Whereas under section 3(1)(f) and (ff) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to direct that coins made at Our Mint other than gold, silver, cupro-nickel and bronze coins shall be current and that any coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount:

And Whereas under section 6(2) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to prescribe the composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of coins of any metal other than gold, silver or cupro-nickel:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denomination of five pounds in gold, in standard silver, in silver piedfort, in platinum piedfort and in cupro-nickel:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd), (f) and (ff), the said section 6(2), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

## FIVE POUND GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## FIVE POUND STANDARD SILVER COIN

2. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of 925 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.503 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## FIVE POUND SILVER PIEDFORT COIN

3. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 56.56 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of 925 parts per thousand fine silver, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.252 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## FIVE POUND PLATINUM PIEDFORT COIN

4. (1) A new coin of platinum of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 94.2 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said platinum coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.96 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The said platinum coin may contain impurities of three-tenths of one per centum.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of the said platinum coin shall be pure platinum.
(6) The said platinum coin shall be current and shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

FIVE POUND CUPRO-NICKEL COIN
5. (1) A new coin of cupro-nickel of the denomination of five pounds shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 28.28 grammes, a standard diameter of 38.61 millimetres, a standard composition of seventy-five per centum copper and twenty-five per centum nickel, and being circular in shape.
(2) In the making of the said cupro-nickel coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.852 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of two per centum copper and two per centum nickel.
(3) The said cupro-nickel coin may contain impurities of three-quarters of one per centum.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The said cupro-nickel coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## DESIGN OF THE COINS

6. The design of the said five pound gold, standard silver, silver piedfort, platinum piedfort and cupro-nickel coins shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "• CHARLES III • $\mathrm{D} \cdot \mathrm{G} \cdot \mathrm{REX} \cdot \mathrm{F} \cdot \mathrm{D} \cdot 5$ POUNDS $"$ and the date of the year, and for the reverse a depiction of two portraits of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II accompanied by her Royal Cypher and the inscription "ELIZABETH REGINA 1926-2022". The coin shall have a plain edge and in incuse letters the inscription ". ELIZABETH II •

DEVOTED TO YOUR SERVICE", save for the cupro-nickel coin which shall have a grained edge.'

And Whereas under section 6(2) of the Coinage Act 1971 We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, by Proclamation to prescribe the composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of coins of any metal other than gold, silver or cupro-nickel:

And Whereas it appears to Us desirable to order that there should be made at Our Mint a new series of coins of the denomination of fifty pence in gold, in gold piedfort, in standard silver, in silver piedfort, in platinum and in cupro-nickel:

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said section 3(1)(a), (b), (c), (cc), (cd), (d), (dd), (f) and (ff), the said section 6(2), and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:

## FIFTY PENCE GOLD COIN

1. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 15.5 grammes, a standard diameter of 27.3 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of 916.7 , and being in the shape of an equilateral curve heptagon.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or fineness specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.078 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of two per mille.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 15.4 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## FIFTY PENCE GOLD PIEDFORT COIN

2. (1) A new coin of gold of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 31 grammes, a standard diameter of 27.3 millimetres, a millesimal fineness of 916.7, and being in the shape of an equilateral curve heptagon.
(2) In the making of the said gold coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or fineness specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.12 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said millesimal fineness of two per mille.
(3) The least current weight of the said gold coin shall be 30.85 grammes.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.

## FIFTY PENCE STANDARD SILVER COIN

3. (1) A new coin of silver of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 8 grammes, a standard diameter of 27.3 millimetres, a standard composition of 925 parts per thousand fine silver, and being in the shape of an equilateral curve heptagon.
(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.196 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## FIFTY PENCE SILVER PIEDFORT COIN

(2) In the making of the said silver coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.24 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of five parts per thousand fine silver.
(3) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(4) The said silver coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## FIFTY PENCE PLATINUM COIN

5. (1) A new coin of platinum of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 19.097 grammes, a standard diameter of 27.3 millimetres, and being in the shape of an equilateral curve heptagon.
(2) In the making of the said platinum coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight or diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.194 grammes; and
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin.
(3) The said platinum coin may contain impurities of three-tenths of one per centum.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The composition of the standard trial plates to be used for determining the justness of the said platinum coin shall be pure platinum.
(6) The said platinum coin shall be current and shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## FIFTY PENCE CUPRO-NICKEL COIN

6. (1) A new coin of cupro-nickel of the denomination of fifty pence shall be made, being a coin of a standard weight of 8 grammes, a standard diameter of 27.3 millimetres, a standard composition of seventy-five per centum copper and twenty-five per centum nickel, and being in the shape of an equilateral curve heptagon.
(2) In the making of the said cupro-nickel coin a remedy (that is, a variation from the standard weight, diameter or composition specified above) shall be allowed of an amount not exceeding the following, that is to say:
(a) a variation from the said standard weight of an amount per coin of 0.336 grammes;
(b) a variation from the said standard diameter of 0.125 millimetres per coin; and
(c) a variation from the said standard composition of two per centum copper and two per centum nickel.
(3) The said cupro-nickel coin may contain impurities of three-quarters of one per centum.
(4) The variation from the standard weight will be measured as the average of a sample of not more than one kilogram of the coin.
(5) The said cupro-nickel coin shall be legal tender for the payment of any amount not exceeding ten pounds in any part of Our United Kingdom.

## DESIGN OF THE COINS

7. The design of the said fifty pence gold, standard silver, silver piedfort, platinum and cupro-nickel coins shall be as follows:
'For the obverse impression Our effigy with the inscription "• CHARLES III • D • G • REX • F • D 50 PENCE", and for the reverse the four Quarterings of Our Royal Arms each contained in a shield and arranged in saltire with, in the intervening spaces, a Rose, a Thistle, both slipped and leaved, a sprig of Shamrock and a Leek; in the centre the Crown and in the base the date of the year. The coin shall have a plain edge.'
8. This Proclamation shall come into force on the fourteenth day of September Two thousand and twenty-two.

The following report from the Committee of Council for the Affairs of Jersey and Guernsey was today read at the Board:
"In accordance with the General Order of Reference of 22nd February 1952 the Committee have considered a Petition of the States of Guernsey:


#### Abstract

"That, in pursuance of their Resolution of 20th April 2022, the States of Alderney at a meeting on 20th April 2022 approved a Projet de Loi entitled the Government of Alderney (Amendment) Law, 2022 and requested the Bailiff to present a most humble Petition to Your Majesty in Council praying for Your Royal Sanction to it. The Petition most humbly prays that Your Majesty might be graciously pleased to sanction the Government of Alderney (Amendment) Law, 2022 and to order that it shall have force of law in the Island of Alderney. "The Committee have considered the Projet de Loi and have agreed to report that it may be advisable for Your Majesty to approve and ratify it".

His Majesty, having taken the report into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve and ratify the Projet de Loi (a copy of which is annexed to this Order) and to order that it, together with this Order, shall have the force of law in the Island of Alderney and shall be entered on the Register of the Island of Guernsey and observed accordingly.


His Majesty's Officers in the Bailiwick of Guernsey, and all others whom it may concern, are therefore to take notice of His Majesty's Order and to proceed accordingly.
